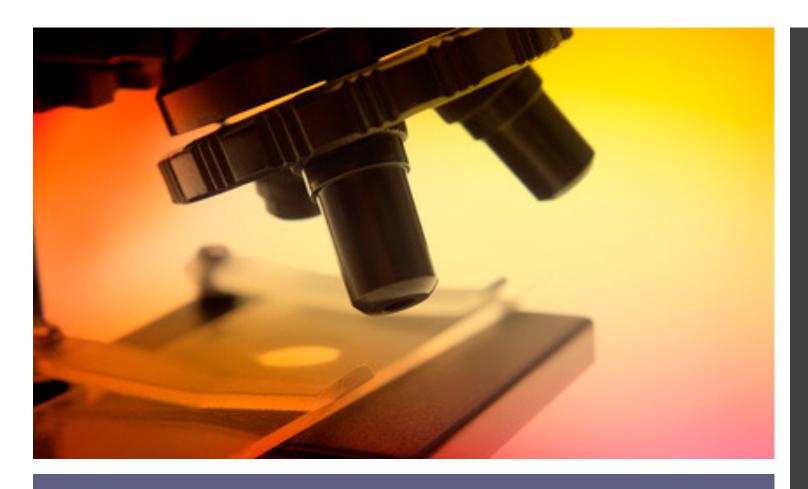




Competence Matrix: Managing Research & Higher Education Contexts through English

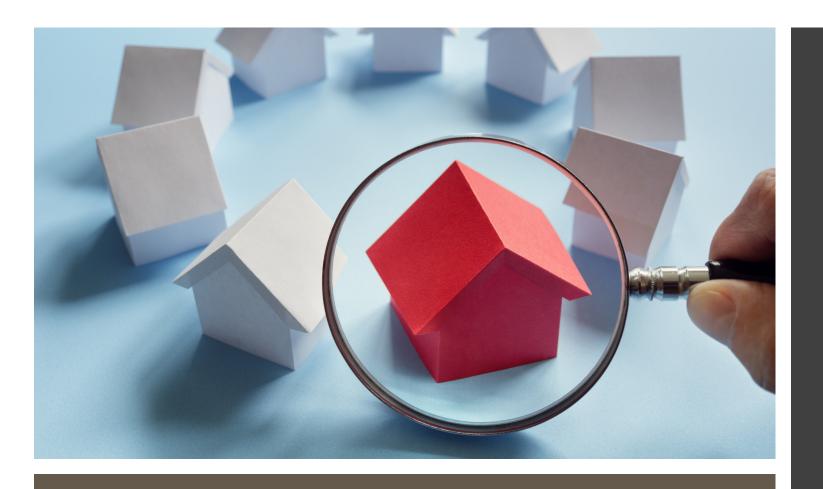
The Competence Matrix is used to evaluate abilities to manage teaching and learning contexts in English on the basis of a video-recorded demonstration. Developed for the TEHE certificate (Teaching through English in Higher Education) evaluation processes, the Matrix is a multi-dimensional tool for evaluating expert and professional abilities alongside use of English as a language of communication.
